Culturual Immersion-Wynne's Trip to Arnhem Land



In August of this year, I was fortunate enough to be able to go on a cultural immersion trip through Culture College to North East Arnhem Land. This trip is part of SASY's Reconciliation Action Plan commitments around professional development for staff.

Our first two nights we camped at Gulkula, the site of Garma festival. It is situated on an important Yolngu ceremonial site, looking over a lush gully of paperbark trees. That evening we were welcomed with a smoking ceremony and bush medicine healing from Yolngu healers. We also met with very important elder Djarpirri, who is a Culture College director and important community leader. We were very lucky that Djarpirri sang ceremonial song for our group, which was the first she had done this. This was very special and moved us greatly.

The following day we visited Makassan beach, one of the sites of trade between Yolngu and Indonesian sailors. There are many hundreds of years of trade between Yolngu and Makassans and it's a reflection of the respect and hospitality of the Yolngu people. We visited an art centre to see beautiful examples of weaving, bark painting and carving. The depth and complexity of the symbolism and craftmanship was astounding.

The following day we drove 3.5 hours to the Nyinyikay homeland, where a Yolngu family had welcomed us to stay and learn from them on their country and in their traditional home. Due to their geographical location, Yolngu culture had not been as badly disrupted by colonisation and a homeland is where they have been living on their traditional country undisturbed.

Once we were in Nyinyikay, we really settled into being on Country. It was made clear to us that there would not be any set times or schedules, because everything was dependent on the family and their connection with Country as to when it was the right time to do things. It gave us the opportunity to explore the beautiful natural environment, chat with each other, get to know the family and really relax. I took the time to meditate, practice mindfulness and connect with nature.

We did a variety of different workshops such as walks around the area to see native foods and bush medicines, learning about the kinship systems, learning Yolngu Matha (language), the women learnt how to prepare the grass and weave, the men learnt about making and playing a yidaki, we helped making a fish trap, visit important locations and more importantly, spend time with the family and learn through conversation. We were given Yolngu names – mine was Gurtha, which means fire.

Every aspect of Yolngu culture is interconnected, from the way people are named and what tribe they are a part of, to each animal, plant, geographical feature, even moments in time. Everyone has a place and some responsibility and this is carefully balanced. Its like yin and yang. Everything is valued as an essential part of this interconnected web.

The spirit of Yolngu was of respect, love, generosity, and responsibility. They understood that looking after their culture, as well as sharing it with others will not only strengthen the culture, it will lead to greater respect and understanding between Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal people.

"They had a deep care for us and a wicked sense of humour. The depth and complexity of their spirituality as well as their wisdom, was extremely interesting and moving."

When we left Nyinyikay, we participated in a traditional dance and ended with hugs and well-wishing prayers. We travelled back to Gulkula for a final night on Country before returning home. We reflected on what we had learnt and experienced. We met with Auntie Djarpirri again and shared our experiences, who bookended our trip with another beautiful ceremonial song.

It was expressed to us that when we learn from Yolngu, but then also strive to embody those learnings, this will have a positive ripple effect in all the spheres of influence we exist in. Due to this trip, I feel I can advocate for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people with more depth of understanding, integrate First Nations' perspectives in a more meaningful way into my practice and tread more lightly on the earth.

It was a beautiful, life changing experience that I am deeply grateful for.



















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
